lthough there's an obvious allure for sampling fried butter or soaring above barns full of livestock on roller coasters and Ferris wheels at the nearby state or county fair, there's something special even the biggest festivals around can't muster up: simple small-town charm.

Small-town festivals are a great way to experience quiet community destinations in America's Heartland. During those events, residents take to the streets with arms wide open to welcome crowds and offer outsiders a chance to party like locals. Typically run by volunteers and put on with loads of town spirit and pride, the festivals invite visitors to come and soak in the quirks and charms of small-town celebrations.

MENDOTA SWEET CORN FESTIVAL Mendota, Illinois

Located in northern Illinois, Mendota is a city that not only stakes its claim as "the World's Greatest Little City," but also plays host to the one and only Mendota Sweet Corn Festival. The festival began as a one-day street fair 65 years ago and has now grown to a full-fledged three-and-a-half-day event with more than 60,000 attendees.

Each year, the festival takes place during the second full weekend in August and features a carnival, a parade, a craft show, a flea market, food booths and tons of corn — 50 tons of corn, to be exact.

"My favorite event is the free corn serving on Sunday," said Alison Wasmer, executive director of the Mendota Area Chamber of Commerce. "That's really what the festival is all about: many volunteers welcoming people to our town."



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LEGENDS AND LOGGING DAYS Park Rapids, Minnesota

For more than 35 years, the people of Park Rapids, Minnesota, have been celebrating the second weekend in August by releasing their inner lumberjacks — and "lumberjills" — with their annual Legends and Logging Days festival. The festival began in honor of the rich heritage of logging in the Park Rapids region of the country and has become one of the mainstays on the town's annual calendar.

From chainsaw sculpting and kickboxing demonstrations to live music and a chili and hot-wings cook-off, there is something for everyone in the group to see, taste, discover and enjoy at the festival. Along with a farmers market and tons of food vendors — try the buffalo burgers — the main event at the festival is a wood-chopping and -sawing contest that puts world champion and world-record-breaking lumberjacks to the test.

"We have added many demonstrations of historic crafts and activities, such as black powder encampments, Black Swan Cooperage making oak whiskey barrels on-site, dutch-oven cooking, historic book binding and much more," said Katie Magozzi, executive director of the Park Rapids Lakes Area Chamber of Commerce and Tourism Office.
